Report from Carol Stephens on Georgia Women for a Change Legislative briefing

Jan. 26th - The two major pieces of legislation that GWFC is organizing its members to support are the Freedom From Human Trafficking bill that Rep. Edward Lindsey is sponsoring and Flexible Sick Leave which will have a sponsor by the end of the week.

Rep. Lindsey is working with Attorney General Sam Olens and the chair of the committee Rich Golick on it right now. Both of these gentlemen are supportive of the bill, so we in Cobb are well represented in this effort! If you know these men, please be sure to let them know how important their support is! Rep. Lindsey became involved in this because the church he grew up in on North Ave. and his present church, All Saints Episcopal, contacted him for support as they are both located in the area where most of the sex trafficking takes place. He stated that drug trafficking penalties are higher than sex trafficking penalties. In this bill he wants the assets of the traffickers to be seized by the state and the proceeds used to pay for the restitution of the the victims. He also shared that the National Conference of State Legislatures have adopted this issue as one their important issues to address. PBA 30 will be airing a documentary film on this issue, Candy Shop, this Sunday. Watch for it!

The Flexible Sick Leave bill will require businesses that give employees sick days to allow those days to be used for caring for a sick child, spouse, or elderly parent. Presently, businesses can disallow that kind of leave and even fire workers who use it for other than their own personal illness. Presently, 70% of Georgia workers are denied Flexible Sick Leave.

The Budget - Revenues are up from last year, but we have had a 20% drop since 2007. It is predicted that it will take us until 2015 to return to pre-recession income levels. \$27million must be cut from the Jan. - June 2011 budget. Gov. Deal is targeting cuts rather than making them across the board. The Dept. of Human Services budget has been cut 25% from 2008-2010. Ten thousand families will no longer receive childcare subsidies. It also cuts funds for Alzheimers respite care and completely removes care for Domestic Violence victims!! There will be no increase in funds for the increase in Peachcare enrollees. Go to GBPI.org to find out more about the budget.

HB47 allows out of state insurance companies to come in to Georgia and sell policies. They will not have to meet the state mandates that we have fought so hard to win that provide coverage for women and children.

Bobby Franklin has again made sure that he dropped the first bill. HB1 requires the death penalty for doctors who perform abortions. He also wants to do away with the Health and Human Services Dept. and wants to eliminate the requirement for vaccinations.

Rep. Earl Erhardt is no longer the chair of the Rules Committee. It is now being chaired by John Meadows. Terry England, a Barrow County farmer is now the chair of the Appropriations Committee.

From Cobb, Rep. Sharon Cooper and Alisha Thomas Morgan attended the breakfast. The next breakfast will be held on Feb. 23rd. Hope you will join me and celebrate my birthday with me!
