While we could use every member working three or more shifts, we will be delighted with whatever time you can give. Please try to volunteer for at least one shift at a **Peak** or a **Critical** time. **Peak** times are **Set-Up** (Sun, 9/23), Preview Night (Tues, 9/25), all day Wednesday (9/24 – **double hours credit**), and **Teardown** (Sun, 9/30). We want family (including teenagers) and friends to help, especially during Set-up and Teardown, which require some physical exertion, but can be a lot of fun! **Critical** shifts have been traditionally understaffed; these are <u>Wednesday morning</u>, <u>Friday night</u>, all day <u>Saturday</u>, and <u>Sunday afternoon</u>. Preview night is always lots of fun. If you are unable to work but want to make a contribution, we have estimated the earnings as \$10 per volunteer hour. Donations are always welcome.

Consider working 2 consecutive shifts to cut down on commuting time (someone will cover for you while you take a break between shifts), or carpooling with a friend in the evening. Finally, the delegates agreed to strike all references in the bylaws to the International Federation of University Women, except for a clause that provides for international reciprocity, as a courtesy.
