Our Book Group meeting will be Monday, April 20th at 6:30 pm in the home of



CTAUN CONFERENCE

On Saturday, March 21st, Arden Stone and Debbie Karvey attended the 8th Annual Atlanta CTAUN Conference. This year, the event was hosted on the Georgia Tech Campus.

Keynote speaker from the UN, Ramu Damodaran, addressed the issue of local challenges innovatively transformed into global initiatives.

Dr. Douglas Edwards with CEISMC (Center for Educational Integration of Science, Math and Computing) at Georgia Tech, provided an inspirational look at student outreach between US and South Africa high schools students pursuing feasible energy solutions.
